(One background note about Youth Tour: a few years ago, the Board of Directors adopted a policy that allows for SREC employees' children to go on Youth Tour, if they are a high school junior and want to go, and their inclusion does not count towards the long-standing policy of sending three eligible high school juniors to Youth Tour every year. This eliminated any conflicts of interest during the students' application process.)

Facetime calls, text messages, and Facebook posts kept us up to date on all the activities, and there were <u>a lot</u> of activities for the kids. One of the students even "vlogged" the week's happenings and I gained an additional, and different, perspective on the trip. "Vlog" is not a word I use often in this column. For those of you that aren't raising or around teenagers much – a "vlog" is like a video diary. You get to see the sights they are talking about, but usually the camera is pointed at themselves!

I have previously spoken with parents of Youth Tour kids and they have all said how great the trip was. But when you see, with your own eyes, nine kids get off a rental bus after the return trip home, acting more like a family than when they left, hugging each other and planning summer gettogethers, you realize that this was an amazing

opportunity for them. Its not just the historic sites they got to see, or the great museums they got to visit, or even the Congressman they got to meet and speak with...it was more than that. It was the opportunity for these kids to go away and be themselves, free from families and best friends and social cliques. They learned how to start a conversation, in person. They were able to meet kids from across the country, from different backgrounds and ways of life, and also from very similar ones, and strike up new friendships. When your child gets in the car after their return home and cannot stop talking about the trip - let's just say I am still waiting for the word "amazing" not to be used in every other sentence. I know this trip was worth the effort it takes by NRECA, PREA, and Sussex REC to make it happen for these students.

As Sussex Rural's CEO, I can tell you that Youth Tour is a great opportunity open to juniors in high school that live in our service territory. As father of a Youth Tour participant, I can assure you that this is an incredible experience for a child, and that some of the kids really do gain life-changing growth. I know that they have truly experienced something, as my daughter would say, "Amazing"!
